## Summer InDownton

### Citizen Science Monitoring on the River Avon

Concerns about the quality of water in the River Avon have led to the formation of For the Love of Water (FLOW) CIC - a not-for-profit Community Interest Company based in Downton, dedicated to improving the health of the River Avon Special Area of

Conservation (SAC). By acting as a community hub, individuals and organisations with a shared passion for the River Avon can help to build a picture of river health and target improvements. In partnership with the Wessex Rivers Trust they have setup their own water quality and ecology monitoring on the river to build on data already collected by the Environment Agency. Their small but growing network of 'Citizen Scientists' regularly collect samples, with all data displayed in real time on their website. They are also collating, sharing and linking to lots of information and data about the river.

Adam Ellis, the founder of FLOW admits to having been obsessed with rivers and lakes since he was young. He moved to the Avon Valley in 2012 and now lives a short walk away from the river in Downton. He founded FLOW CIC to encourage community buy-in to the Salisbury Avon catchment, building on the work already being done and embracing the flourishing citizen science movement.

He says: "Our River Avon is a fantastic local resource, a focal point for communities living along its valley and a globally rare 'Chalk River' habitat. Regrettably it is classed as being in 'Unfavourable Condition'

by Natural England, and only 'Moderate Ecological Status' by the Environment Agency. From talking to local land managers, anglers and residents, there is a perception of decline in river health. You will have seen lots in the press recently about sewage pollution, but this is just one of many factors impacting our river fitting into three key categories – Water Quality, Water Quantity, and Habitat."

You can get involved by subscribing to their newsletter and social media, and sharing this with friends and also by getting in touch to help collect water samples or monitoring river invertebrate. You might have skills to help in other ways, such as marketing, fundraising, web design.

FLOW is keen to receive any stories or historic photos of the river, which could be hosted on the website, as FLOW is potentially interested in any records of historic management of the river.

If you run a local business, they are looking for companies to sponsor the kit that volunteers use. Adam said: "It's a great local way to boost your environmental credentials. Without support we are severely limited in our reach." More details at loveofwater.org or email info@loveofwater.org.

### Comment


### SILVER SALISBURY

### THE SUN SHINES ON THE CUCKOO FAIR

The 42nd Cuckoo Fair saw around 18,000 people visit which makes it the biggest volunteer organised event in Wiltshire. There were over 250 separate stallholders including 60 new stalls.

The Fair had a day of sunshine after some very wet weather in the days before.

"I have a fantastic team of people and without them the Fair wouldn't happen." said Cuckoo Fair Chair, Tony Pike. "They were determined that the Fair would go ahead despite the forecast weather. We were glad the sun shone and it was a great success!"

The Fair's main purpose is to support the local community and organisations by facilitating fundraising at the Fair. Joanna Ramsay Horbury, one of the Village Liaison Team said "Many of our community groups rely on the Fair as their biggest source of fundraising, so we all felt it was really important that the Fair went ahead. As people tot up what they raised on the day we are already delighted to hear that 1st Downton Scouts made £4,600 net profit. Not a bad amount for one day of flipping burgers!" We estimate that since 1980 the Fair has helped raise in excess of £1 million for local

organisations.

This year's Fair cost around £36,000 to put on which included marquee hire, security,

ambulance cover, PA system, insurance and entertainment. The Fair relies on the income from stall holders, advertising and contributions from car parking. Donations from the local fundraisers and village businesses, which benefit from the income they generate during the Fair, also help. Any money over and above running costs is ploughed back into the Fair for the following year or into the village for example, covering the cost of the village Christmas tree.

The committee want to offer their thanks to the organisations and businesses which continue to support the Fair and most of all to long suffering family members of the committee. This natural water meadow is managed and maintained by volunteers on behalf of the village. This is an opportunity to spend a summer afternoon finding out about the sights and sounds of nature on the green: the birds, the trees, the flowers. Learn what wildlife lives here, how to take care of it and



keep it safe for future generations. Willow grows in abundance on the green, and local willow weaver Alison Pritt will be there to share her skills - and also display and sell some of her structures. More activities are planned - look out for details. Members of the Millennium Green Committee will be on hand to answer questions and share information on how you can support their endeavours.

### DOWNTON SOCIETY UPDATE

At the March public meeting to discuss flood risk management, held with representatives of Wiltshire Council, Wessex Water and the Environment Agency, Wessex Water announced plans to survey the condition of the sewers and from this, will plan to address the problems that they discover.

Nikki Wilson from the Downton Society comments: "From recent publicity, we all know about the widespread problem of river pollution. In the Downton area, it is caused partially by surface runoff but also by ground water entering sewage pipes. The system, including the treatment plant at Moot Lane, becomes overloaded and polluted water is discharged into the River Avon."

The Society is supporting member Adam Ellis and is considering lending financial support to FLOW(CIC) by funding test kits to collect data about the state of the river. (See front page article)

In a plea for more people to get involved, Nikki Wilson says: "Sometimes the best thing to do is join a group that can provide information, co-ordinate action and pool the resources and skills of members. Societies need fresh ideas and new members to thrive; and although most people are busy with work and family commitments, volunteering doesn't have to involve endless formal meetings or serving on committees. Engagement is about being informed, expressing support for issues you care about and working together to make a positive impact on the community in which we live. It can be fun as well as very satisfying." The Downton Society focuses mainly on Conservation and planning, but has also been involved in campaigning for the Flood Defences and the HGV ban, and against overdevelopment on the flood plain. It helps maintain footpaths and stiles as part of a Parish Council working group and funds & plants-up flower tubs on the Borough Greens. Members have engaged in bridge cleaning, litter picks, InBloom, and the planting of daffodils at Beacon corner.

### MICHAEL TURNER BY HIS GRANDDAUGHTER

delighted friends and family from around the world with their sensational garden. Together, they travelled widely - they were best of friends. Michael continued to devote himself to his family after Pauline's death. His determination and integrity influenced all the family.

Spirited, generous and witty, Michael was a credit to his family; he will be deeply missed and lovingly remembered.

### FROM NEWSPAPER DELIVERY TO MOLDOVA AID PROJECT

Later this summer, village paperboy Andy Fitt (age 64), will once again be joining a team of enthusiastic and dedicated volunteers from the charity TEECH. TEECH will be returning to Moldova, Europe's poorest country, to deliver humanitarian aid, medical supplies, and to undertake projects to install new bathrooms at two schools in the villages of Mindresti Noi and Sloveanca, both in the Sîngerei District.

Neither school has indoor toilets. They currently use an outhouse - a small brick building - which has a concrete floor, and then holes over a pit.

At each school the team will turn one room into a bathroom for the girls and one for the boys, which not only provides them with indoor toilets for the first time, but privacy and hygienic conditions.

The team will also tile, paint and anything else they may have time for in the eight days in Moldova.

### HERITAGE TRAIL CURIOSITIES

As the work to refresh the village heritage trail continues, InDownton will be high lighting some of the less well known historic sites in the village. There are three buildings which were previously schools at one time and now have other uses. These include the British Girls School at the end of The Borough on the path through to Headlands. The area was known as 'School Rails'. The school building is now a private house, having previously been a chapel and a car workshop (Headlands Garage). The only visible evidence that it was a school are incision marks on the bricks where pupils sharpened their styluses for writing on slates. You need to look carefully to see them.

### JUNE SKY AT NIGHT BY MICHAEL BARRATT

The Sun is in the constellation of Taurus (the Bull) at the start of June. It moves into Gemini (the Twins) on Tuesday 21 June, the day of the Summer Solstice. Even in the middle of the night the Sun never gets far enough below the horizon for the sky to get properly dark and the fainter stars shown on the accompanying map will be hard to see. At this time of year we see perpetual twilight throughout the night. This year, in particular we are seeing a lot of solar activity (already some remarkable aurorae in the northern hemisphere) with many sunspots speckled across the Sun's surface.

June is a good time to start observing the Milky Way as it extends across the sky from Cygnus (the Swan) down towards its core in the constellation of Sagittarius (the Archer). Sweeping along the line of our own Galaxy with binoculars will reveal a myriad of stars far too many to count. A beautiful and awe-inspiring sight just requiring a pair of binoculars to appreciate the wonder which is own home Galaxy.


Venus continues to dominate the northwestern sky in the early evenings shining brightly. The "Evening Star", as it is known when in the west, begins this month near the
